Education Sunday

This past Sunday we marked Education Sunday, a national day of prayer and celebration for everyone involved in education. Held each year on the second Sunday of September, it is an opportunity to give thanks for the gift of education and to reflect on the important role our schools play in shaping both lives and communities.

In Sunday's Gospel, Jesus reminds us of the power of forgiveness and calls us to be instruments of God's love, grace and peace in the world. These values are at the heart of Catholic education, where children are encouraged to grow not only in knowledge but also in faith, compassion and service. In his Education Sunday pastoral letter, Archbishop Bernard Longley spoke of the vocation of all who serve in our schools and invited Catholics to consider becoming Foundation Governors or Directors, describing governance as a practical way to serve Christ and help keep the mission of Catholic education at the heart of school life

We give thanks for all those who minister in education and for the privilege of working together to form Christ-centred pupils with kind hearts, questioning minds and a hunger for justice.

Pupil Leadership in action

It has been a wonderfully busy and inspiring week for our pupil leadership teams. Our School Council, Spiritual Council, CAFOD Club and Rights Respecting School Monitors have come together to share ideas, plan initiatives and explore ways to further enhance school life while supporting those in need through charitable outreach. Their enthusiasm, commitment and creativity have been a real joy to see, and I look forward to sharing updates as their exciting plans begin to take shape.

Admissions Update

We've had an overwhelming response from prospective families, with over 60 new applications across various year groups since the start of term. It's incredibly heartening to see that St. Mary's continues to be a school of choice within our community. We are currently at full capacity, with a growing waiting list. As a Catholic school, applications from Catholic families are prioritised. While we regret not being able to offer places to more children, this interest is a testament to the strength, warmth, and reputation of our school.

Important Allergy Reminder

A gentle but important reminder: we have children in school with severe nut allergies. For their safety, no products containing nuts are allowed in school—this includes items such as nutty breakfast bars, almond cakes, and Nutella sandwiches. If your child brings a packed lunch, please ensure it is completely nut-free. Additionally, children should not bring lip balms, sprays, or creams into school, as these may contain ingredients that pose a risk to those with allergies. Any creams or medications must be handed in via the school office so they can be stored and administered safely. You can find our full medicines policy on the school website.

Winter Uniform

As the mornings grow chillier and summer begins to feel like a distant memory, we kindly ask that all children now transition into their winter uniform. This includes a gold shirt or blouse, striped tie, royal blue sweatshirt or cardigan, and grey school trousers, skirt, or pinafore. Footwear should be plain black shoes—please note that trainers and boots are not permitted. We are incredibly proud of our school identity, and the winter uniform really helps our children look smart, confident, and ready to learn. If you need any support sourcing uniform items, please don't hesitate to contact the school office—we're here to help. A gentle reminder to ensure all uniform items are clearly labelled with your child's name. With **school photos taking place on Thursday 15th October**, it's important that all children are in full winter uniform by then. Children continue to wear their PE kits (where plain trainers are allowed) on their PE days.

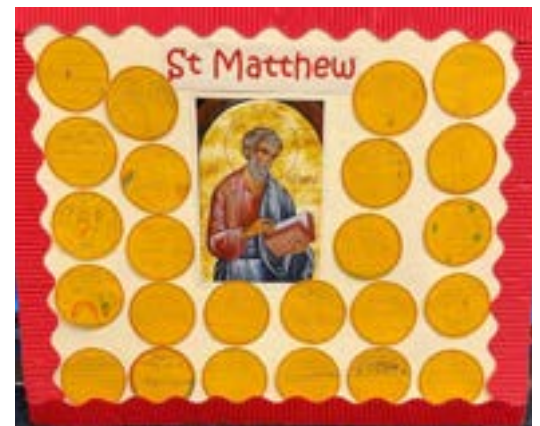
God wants us to: –

School Fund

Our School Fund is a vital source of income for our school.

It pays for the 'extras' such as Inspire workshops, curriculum resources, Christmas activities, theatre or performances as well as subsidising school trips.

These 'extras' are enjoyed by all year groups at St Mary's throughout the year.

As we have been accepted as a charity for tax purposes, we can claim the tax on donations to school fund from parents who are UK taxpayers, if those parents sign a Gift Aid Declaration. This means that for every pound you give we get an extra 25p from the Inland Revenue, helping your donation go further. Contribution to School Fund is entirely voluntary and we are very grateful to those parents who regularly support the school in this way.

However, in the last few years the amount of school fund received has dropped quite significantly. There are probably many reasons for this, but perhaps the most obvious is remembering to send in a donation every year, half term or term.

Several parents make their contribution by standing order
and we are very grateful to them all.

Please consider this option, as consequently, by setting up a standing order, for say £2 per month per family, you will guarantee the school a monthly income on which we can reclaim tax and not have to think about it again whilst your child is at St Mary's.

If you feel unable to sign up to a monthly payment, why not pay £20 per year via SchoolGateway or a one-off bank transfer, again with a Gift Aid Declaration, if applicable. All we ask in this instance is that you send us your completed declaration form in an envelope clearly marked with the name of your child and the value of your donation.

This is an essential book-keeping requirement of the Inland Revenue.

A Gift Aid declaration and a standing order form, have been emailed to you alongside today's newsletter. Where appropriate, please complete and return them to school or if you prefer you can come in to school and fill in a hard copy.

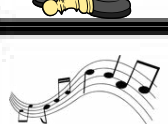

Coats

As the weather is changeable now, please ensure that your child comes to school with their waterproof coats.



Jewellery

To ensure the safety of all children, we will only allow children to wear small stud earrings (not dangly earrings) and a watch, on the days that they are not doing PE. On PE days we are asking that children do not wear any jewellery, so that it is not lost if they are asked to remove it for physical lessons. Thank you for supporting us with this, your child's safety is at the forefront of our uniform decisions. .

Healthy Snacks

Please may we remind all parents that only healthy snacks are permitted in school – your child may have a piece of fruit at break time. Do not send your child in with crisps, sweets or chocolate as they will not be able to consume this on site.

Please also be aware that we do not allow nuts, in order to reduce the chance of children with allergies from having a reaction.



Parking

We ask for everyone's commitment to safe driving and parking around school.

Please do not: –

- stop or park on double yellow lines,
- stop in the middle of the road,
- stop or park on the zig zag lines outside of school
- block the school entrance,
- obstruct dropped kerbs meant for pushchairs,
- obstruct side roads such as Vivian Close.



Parking opposite the school is particularly dangerous for families crossing the road.

We work closely with the Council and Police, and fines may be issued. Any person of the community can photograph inconsiderate or dangerous parking and report...

Labelling of clothing with child's name and class name

Please label all belongings for your child (including lunch boxes / water bottles / school bags / clothing...) Items that are labelled are returned to your child's classroom when they are left somewhere else in school. Items that are not labelled are placed in the parent shelter. You can claim any items needed from the parent shelter. To ensure that no items are lost, label everything with child's name and class.





Medical Conditions and Medication



Thank you to all parents/carers who completed our Pupil Medical Information Form at the end of the last academic year.

If you didn't complete the form, **please can you inform us as soon as possible if your child has a medical condition that we need to know about e.g.: a diagnosed illness or condition that affects or may affect their day to day functioning.** If your child requires any medication that needs to be given during the school day, it must be given to the school office – under no circumstances should it ever be put in a child's school bag.

All medication was returned to parents/carers at the end of last academic year – **please can parents/carers ensure that any medication that may be needed in school is returned or given to school as soon as possible.**

Is my child too ill for school?

As we approach the colder weather, we will see an increase in coughs, colds and illnesses generally. We understand that it can be difficult to sometimes know when your child is too ill for school so please refer to the guide below.



NHS guidance states that **it is fine to send your child to school with slight cough or common cold symptoms,** such as a runny nose, sore throat or headache, as long as they're otherwise well and do not have a high temperature.

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics

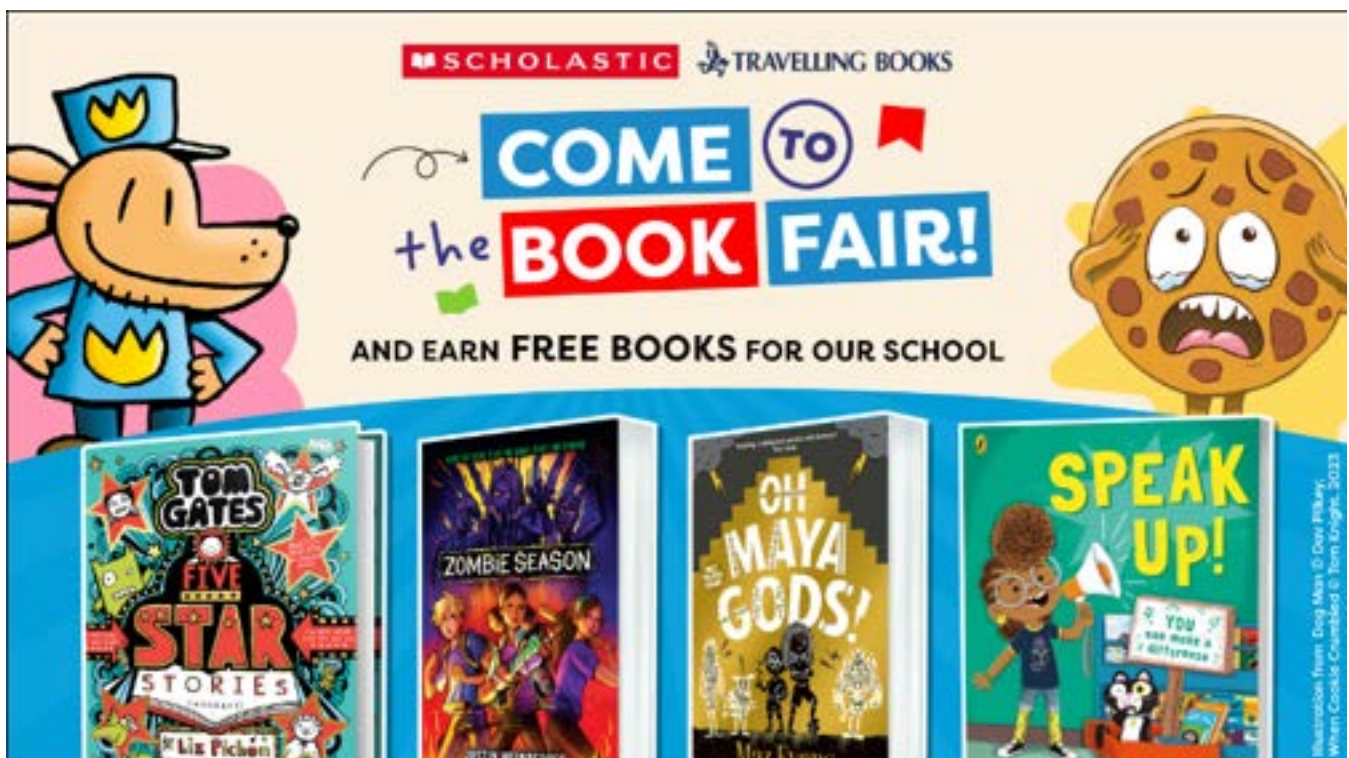

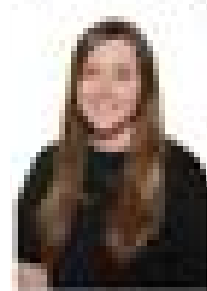

ALWAYS TELL A TRUSTED ADULT

If something online worries, upsets, confuses or scares you, talk to a trusted adult straight away.

CONTENT

Things You See Online

- Tell an adult if you:
- See upsetting, frightening or unkind pictures, videos or messages.
- See content that is hateful about people because of their religion, race, disability or gender.
- Find information that seems fake, confusing or doesn't feel right.
- See pictures or videos that may have been changed or created using AI.

Remember: Not everything online is true or real.

CONTACT

People You Meet Online

- Tell an adult if someone:
- Asks for your name, address, school or passwords.
- Wants to keep secrets from trusted adults.
- Tries to make you do something that feels wrong.
- Offers you gifts, rewards, money or game credits.
- Wants to meet you in person.

Remember: People online are not always who they say they are.

CONDUCT

How People Behave Online

- Tell an adult if:
- Someone sends unkind, rude or bullying messages.
- You see someone being left out or treated unfairly online.
- Someone shares a photo or video without permission.
- Someone pressures you to send pictures, messages or information.

Remember: Be kind, respectful and thoughtful online.

COMMERCE

Money and Online Scams

- Tell an adult if:
- A game asks you to spend money.
- Someone asks you to buy something online.
- You receive messages saying you've won a prize.
- Someone asks for bank details or personal information.
- A website or advert seems too good to be true.

Remember: Never spend money online without permission from a trusted adult.

STOP if something feels wrong.

CLOSE the app, game or website.

BLOCK anyone who is being unkind or makes you uncomfortable.

TELL a trusted adult straight away.

ATTENDANCE



Did you know that missing just 10 days of school a year (equivalent to one day every two weeks) can reduce a child's chances of meeting expected standards in reading, writing, and maths by 30%?

Every day at school counts!

Regular attendance and punctuality are essential for a child's success in primary school. Being present and on time each day helps children build strong learning habits, stay on track with lessons, and develop a sense of responsibility. It also supports social development, as children form friendships and learn teamwork through consistent classroom interaction. Missing school or arriving late can lead to gaps in learning and make it harder for children to catch up. Encouraging good attendance and punctuality from an early age sets the foundation for lifelong learning and success. If you need any support with attendance or punctuality, please speak to Mrs Noone.

Do not book holidays during term time

This is a reminder that holidays during term time are unauthorised. If you intend to take your child out of school during term time, we ask that you complete a holiday request form at least 2 weeks prior to the leave date where possible. Parents may be fined by the Local Authority for taking unauthorised leave of absence. Children need to be in school every day so please ensure holidays are only booked during school holiday time.

Good attendance, continues to be a school and government priority. Good attendance is 96% and above

Remember below 95% is a concern and below 90% is classed as persistent absence. If you have any problems with regards to getting your child to school or you are struggling to improve your child's attendance, please speak to Mrs. Yorke or a member of the SLT team.
